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RELEASE NOTES SUMMARY

These release notes detail the product improvements and new features included in the December 15, 2021, release.

Resolved Issues

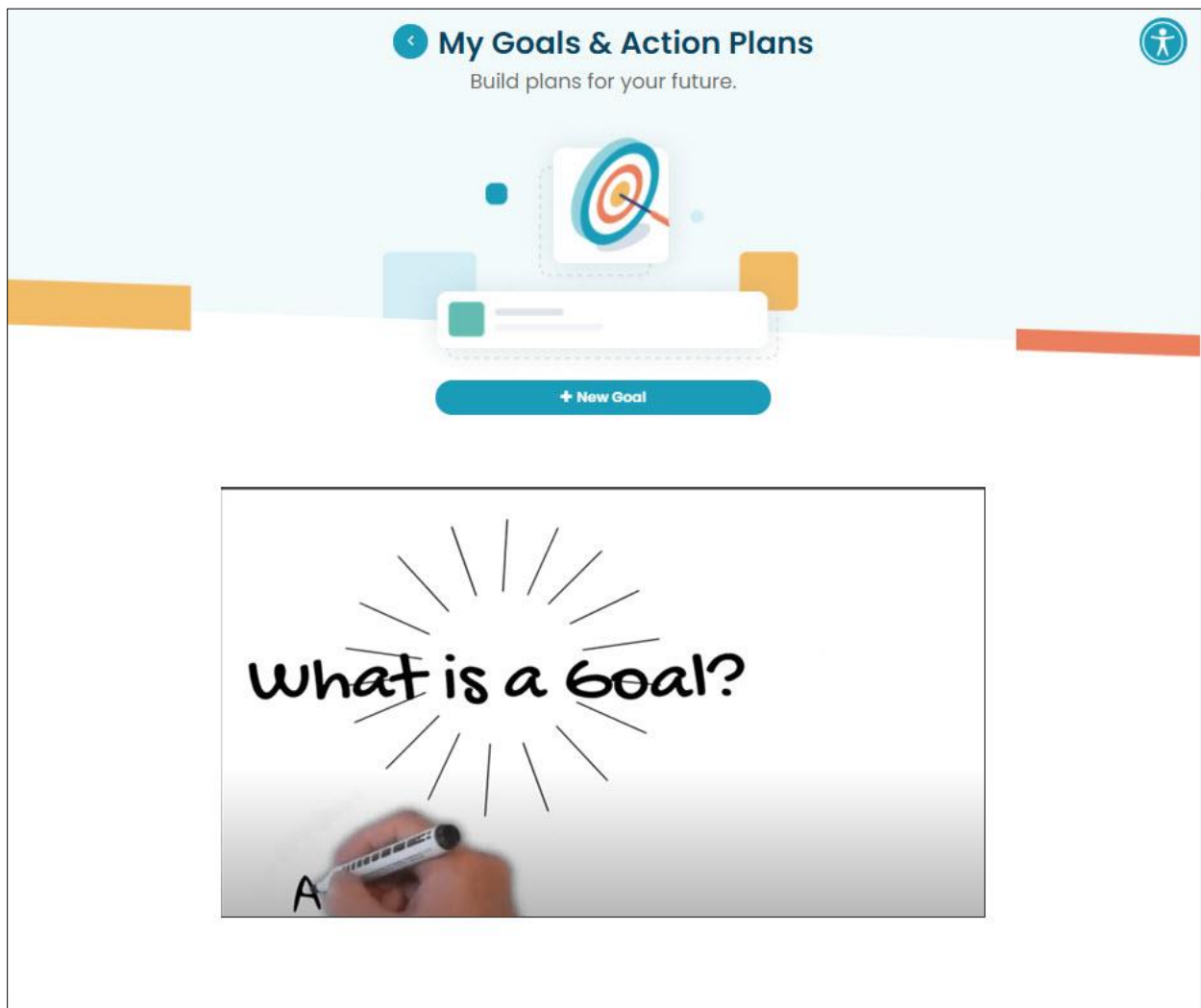

4	Resumes that were uploaded prior to the October release were not fulfilling achievement criteria for tracking and reporting. (Q3Q42021-792)	Previously uploaded resumes now fulfill achievement criteria.
5	The link to the District Survey Manager in the Professional Center was not linking to the Survey Manager. (80533)	The link to the District Survey Manager in the Professional Center now links properly to the District Survey Manager.
6	The email sent by a student inviting their parent to create an account did not clearly indicate how to create a parent account. (80539)	The text and links within the email have been updated.
7	If a user's role was not selected prior to starting a scholarship search, an error message was appearing incorrectly. (69805)	The logic behind the error modal has been updated so that the search is not available if a role has not been selected.

2. REDESIGNED MY GOALS & ACTION PLANS ACTIVITY

The My Goals & Action Plans activity now has an easier-to-use design leading students through the process of creating a goal. Students can optionally watch an introductory video on goals, determine whether their goal is a SMART goal, then create an action plan to achieve their goal. Educators can easily assign and track the redesigned My Goals & Action Plans activity. The report has been simplified and can now be exported.

Creating a Goal

Students can access the My Goals & Action Plans activity either as an assigned activity or through Your Portfolio → Your Profile.



New video explaining goals added to entry page of My Goals & Action Plans

By selecting "+New Goal" students begin the process of adding a new goal. A new form opens that leads students through the steps of defining their goal. Students now choose from 4 goal types – career, academic, personal/social or other. Students can optionally prioritize their goal (Low, Medium, High) and add tags and notes about their goal.

New, easier-to-use goal entry form

Students can then walk through the steps of determining whether their goal is a SMART goal by selecting the + sign on "Is this a SMART goal?". The form opens further to display the five questions used to assess whether a goal meets the definition of a SMART goal. If a student answers "Yes" to all the questions, then they'll know their goal is a SMART goal.

New tool to help students determine whether their goal is a SMART goal

Once a goal has been added (and it can be added whether or not it meets SMART goal criteria), the student can enter an action plan to achieve their goal. The action plan consists of three data fields: action plan task, due date, and status.

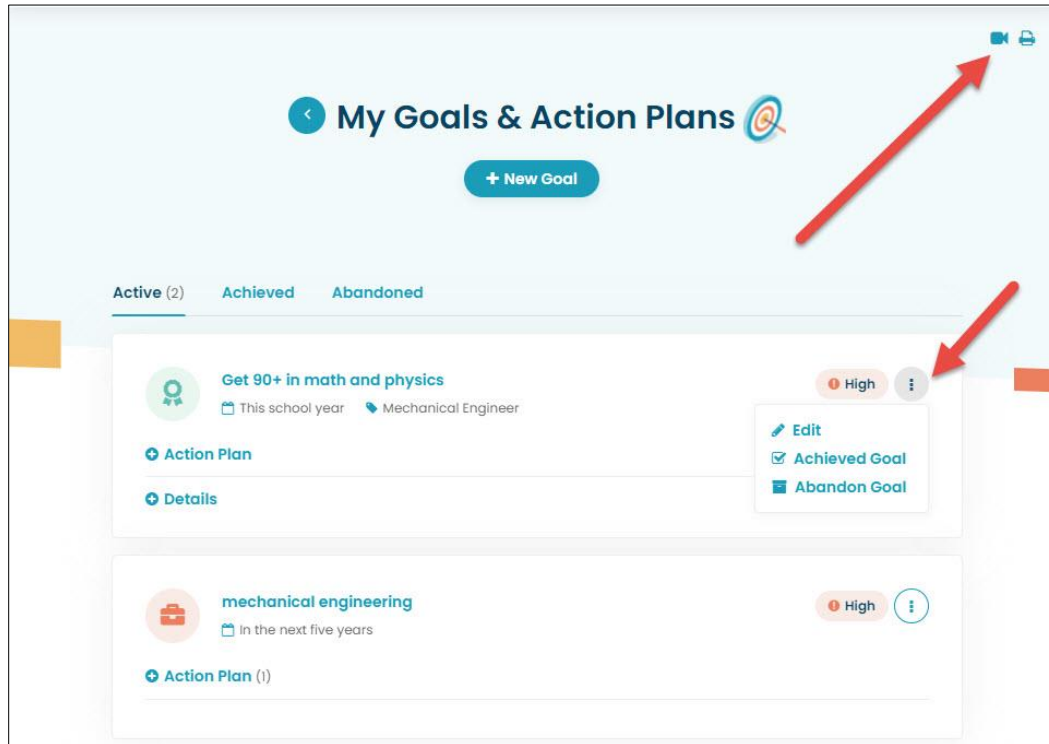

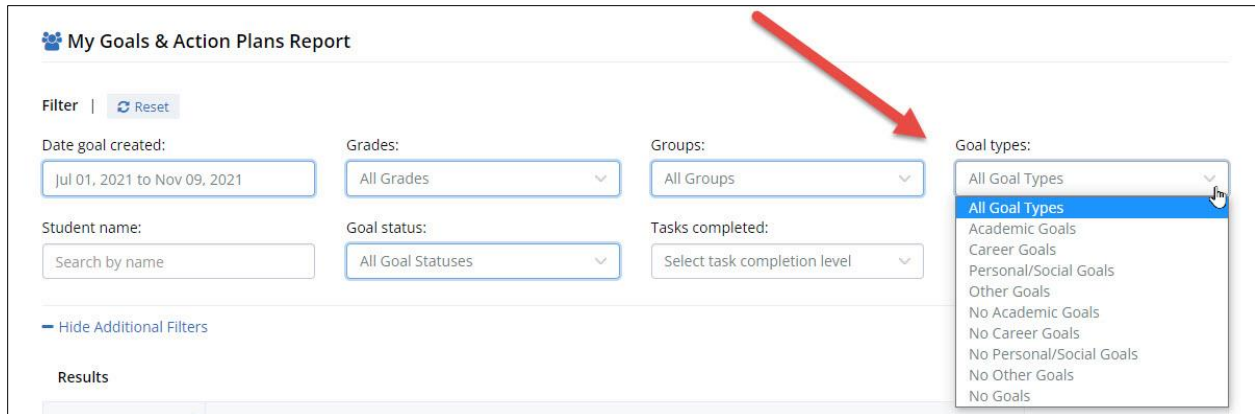

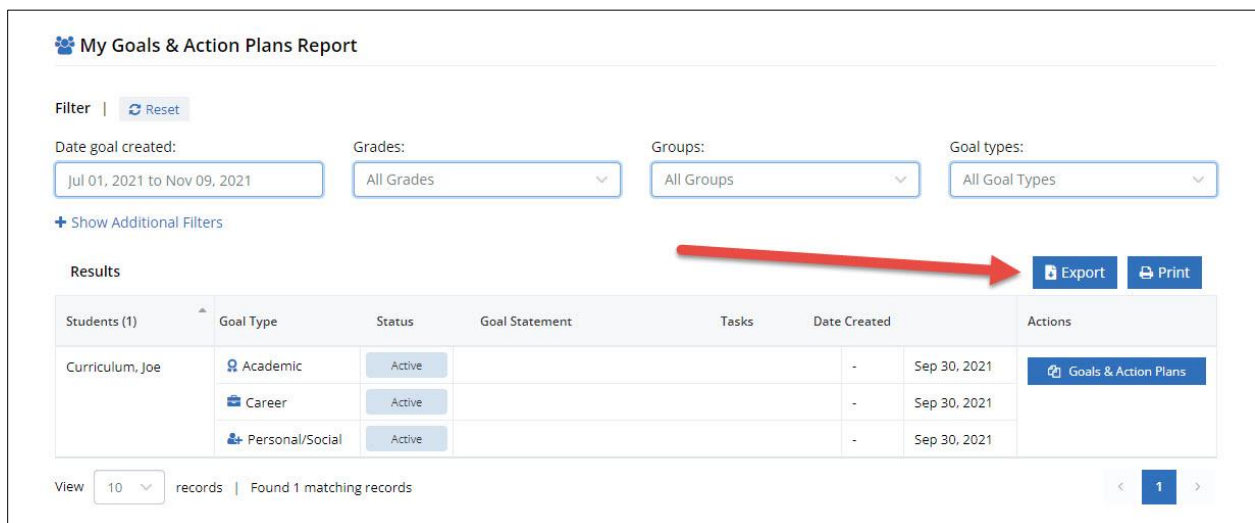
Updated My Goals & Action Plans Report

The My Goals & Action Plans report in the Professional Center has been updated to reflect the redefined goal types (academic, career, personal/social, other) and permits educators to filter for students who have no goals.

Educators can now export the My Goals & Action Plans report. The report is emailed to the requestor and is in CSV format and contains the following information: last name, first name, goal type, status, goal statement, competed tasks, total tasks, date created.



New export functionality

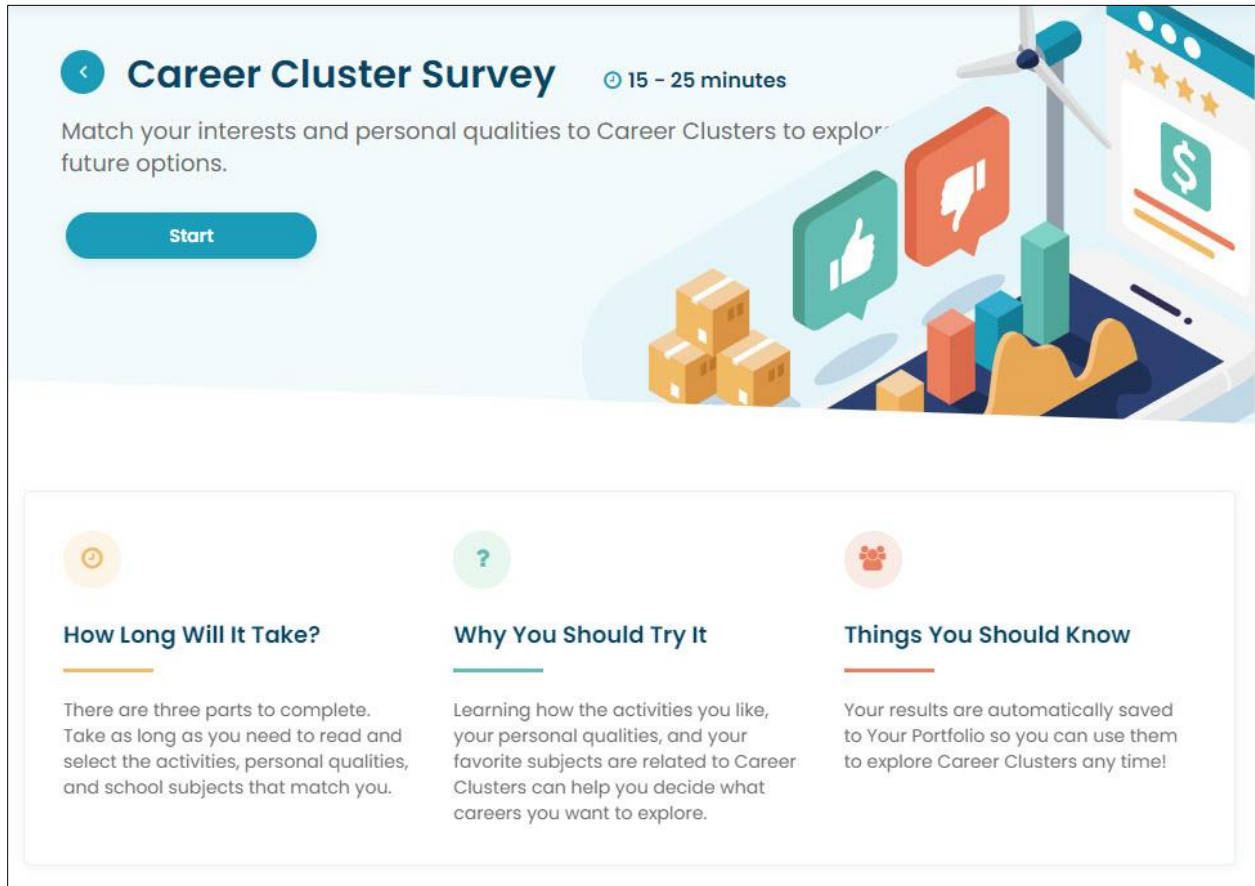
Migrating Data

Students who had previously entered goals into My Goals & Action Plans will see their goals in the revised activity. Some changes will have occurred as a result of the reduction of goal types. Postsecondary goals will now appear as Academic goals and Career Cluster goals will appear as Career goals. The timeframes have also been mapped to the new, shorter list of timeframes.

3. CAREER CLUSTER SURVEY REFRESHED

The look and feel of the Career Cluster Survey has been refreshed with the following changes: new introductory video, new progress bar by section (Activities, Personal Qualities, and School Subjects), page count and updated results page.

The introduction page has a new design and includes a video introducing the concept of Career Clusters.



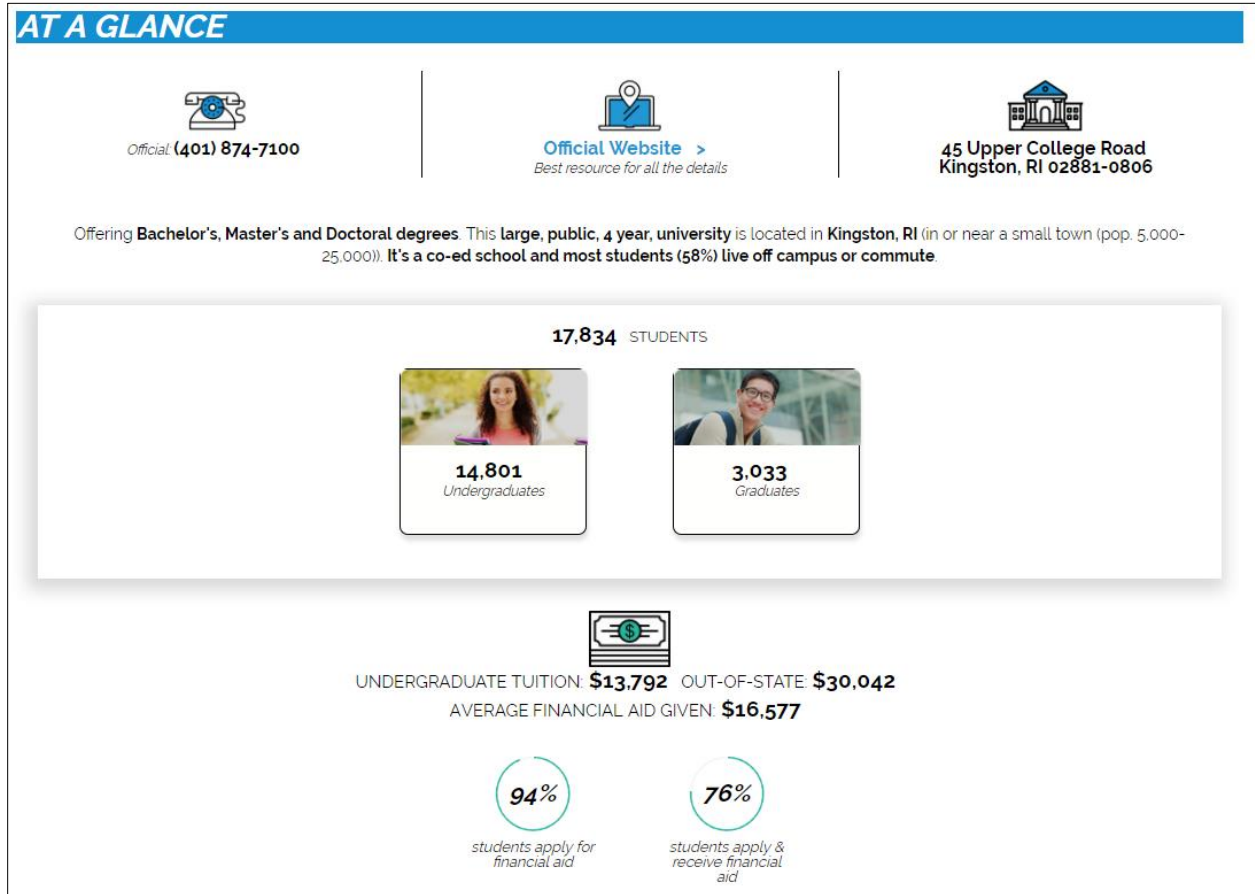

4. NEW POSTSECONDARY PROFILE DATA

The profile information used by students to explore colleges has been updated for more than 4,000 undergraduate schools with the latest information from Petersons. The update includes:

- Revised list of programs for each school.
- Refreshed tuition and admissions information, basic school data such as links to a school's website, contact information, enrollment figures, and more.

5. EMPLOYMENT & OUTLOOK DATA HAS BEEN UPDATED FOR O*NET CAREER PROFILES

The national employment, job openings, and outlook data for O*NET Career Profiles has been updated to the latest available data. The revised data is found in the Money & Outlook section of the Career Profiles.

6. CAREER PROFILES UPDATED

The latest updates from O*NET have been applied to the CFVW.com career database. Over 40 new careers have been added including cardiologist, disc jockey, blockchain engineer, and medical dosimetrist. Some of the new careers may have missing characteristics (for example, aptitudes) as data collection by O*NET continues.

What They Do

Generates radiation treatment plans, develops radiation dose calculations, communicates and supervises the treatment plan implementation, and consults with members of radiation oncology team.

This career is part of the **Health Science** cluster **Diagnostic Services** pathway.

A person in this career:

- Advises oncology team members how beam modifying or immobilization devices should be used in radiation treatment plans.
- Calculates or verify calculations of prescribed radiation doses.
- Calculates the delivery of radiation treatment, such as the amount or extent of radiation per session, based on the prescribed course of radiation therapy.
- Conducts radiation oncology related research, such as improving computer treatment planning systems or developing new treatment devices.
- Creates and transfers reference images and localization markers for treatment delivery using image guided radiation therapy.
- Designs the arrangement of radiation fields to reduce exposure to critical patient structures, such as organs, using computers, manuals, and guides.
- Develops radiation treatment plans in consultation with members of the radiation oncology team.
- Develops requirements for the use of patient immobilization devices and positioning aides, such as molds or casts, as part of treatment plans to ensure accurate delivery of radiation and comfort of patient.
- Develops treatment plans and calculates doses for brachytherapy procedures.
- Educates patients regarding treatment plans, physiological reactions to treatment, or post-treatment care.

Medical dosimetrist Career Profile

Fourteen career profiles have been removed as part of the O*NET update. Users who had previously saved these careers will see a note in the Saved Careers portfolio activity alerting them that a closely related career has been substituted for their saved career. The 14 careers are: geological sample test technician, forest firefighter, slot supervisor, hunter/trapper, rough carpenter, distance learning coordinator, mathematical technician, transport equipment painter, computer operator, fuel cell technicians, public address system announcer, respiratory therapy technician, radio operator, and fabric mender.

7. CIP UPDATED

The “Classification of Instructional Programs” (CIP) is the connecting information between careers and postsecondary institutions. The CIP is a taxonomy of instructional programs that provides a classification system for the thousands of different programs offered by postsecondary institutions. Its purpose is to facilitate the organization, collection, and reporting of fields of study and program completions.

It is updated about every 10 years to reflect changes in instructional program structures and the introduction of new fields of study. In 2020, postsecondary institutions began using 2020 CIP when they reported the degrees and certificates awarded for the 2020 Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Completions Survey.

The 2020 CIP is now applicable to incoming postsecondary data, so CFWV.com has been updated appropriately. Some program names have changed; new programs have been added and three programs have been removed (medical residency programs).
